We are continuing to stress the importance of attendance and good behavior as we near the end of our school year. The funding for all programs and our 2010-2011school budget will be based on daily attendance from our school as well as Doris McQueen. Your child is only able to take full advantage of the educational programs if they attend school every day. I understand that students are ill from time to time and we work with you on those occasions. I ask that you have your child here by 7:55 a.m. each day and that they remain at school until the last bell.

The beginning of the school day sets the tone for the entire day and the end of the day is when teachers are summarizing the days' activities, learning expectations/activities, and walking the students through filling out their student planner. The planner is a very efficient way for you and the classroom teacher to communicate. If the child leaves early, this will be incomplete and will be frustrating for

your child. He/She will be rushed, may not get all the information, or may be confused on assignments, etc. This time is very important so please DO NOT pick up your child early unless they have a doctor's appointment or they are ill. Please remember if you pick up



your child 10 minutes early every day, that's nearly an hour of school they are missing each week.


Each child is such a treasure... within, priceless gifts, THEY hold, how exciting and unpredictable THEIR future; how delicately and patiently, we must mold.

The people we include in our inner circle of influence-our friendscontribute greatly to our attitudes, behavior and style of building future relationships. Building friendships takes work. Teach Empathy To Eliminate Name Calling

Parents Make the Difference

"Nerd." "Sissy." "Fat-So." "Geek." Kids have called each other names for centuries. They put someone down in front of a crowd to look cool to onlookers.

Whatever the reason, name-calling is WRONG. And it's wrong for parents to think bullying and name-calling are just part of growing up. Today these actions have been linked to much harsher school-yard cruelties. To keep kids safe at home and at school, we must try to limit their aggressive behavior. We must foster civility and doing the right thing.

Be sure to:

- Be a good role model. Don't call people names. Say you disapprove when you hear someone putting another down.
- Don't accept a child saying, "I was just joking." It's never a joke when someone is made to feel rejected or ridiculed.
- Voice your anger and disappointment if your child has taunted someone. Have her apologize to her victim

and perhaps others.

- Express your concern if your child has been taunted. Help her reflect on why kids do this. And ponder ways of coping.
- Teach that name-calling hurts everyone. Doing it or tolerating it undercuts our integrity and humanity.
- Foster empathy. Always encourage your child to think how it might feel to be in another's shoes.

Mozelle Johnston/Doris McQueen PTA 2010-2011 School Year

This is a formal notice to the parents of Mozelle Johnston to inform you that the Bylaws of our PTA and Doris McQueen Primary PTA; are in need of amendment. With the merging of the two schools, Doris McQueen Primary and Mozelle Johnston Elementary, the Bylaws that we are currently functioning under must be amended to reflect the new school name, Johnston-McQueen Elementary School. The Mozelle Johnston PTA will be dissolved and one PTA will be in place. The changes are as follows and will affect Article I: Name and Article III: Purposes. The proposed changes are as follows (changes in bold italics):

Article I: Name

"The name of this organization is the Johnston-McQueen Elementary School Parent Teacher Association (PTA), Area 13, Longview, Texas. It is a Local PTA organized under the authority of the Texas Congress of Parent and Teachers (Texas PTA), a branch of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers (National PTA).

Article III: Purposes

Section 1. The Purposes of the *Johnston-McQueen Elementary School* PTA, in common with those of the National PTA and Texas PTA are:

(The rest of article III, including section 2 and 3 remain unchanged.)

No other articles of the Bylaws will be changed in any way. This amendment to Articles I & III needs to be voted on at our **General Meeting on** May 6, 2010 at 6:30 p.m. We MUST have a quorum present and the amendment pass by two-thirds (2/3) of the members present and voting. The amendment will then be presented for submission and acceptance by the Texas PTA.

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Laws of Parenthood

In his book, <u>Riches of the Heart</u>, Steve Goodier shares some important information about being a parent.

Mr. Goodier writes that the first "Law of Parenthood" states that nobody really wants your job, but everybody thinks they can do it better. Sometimes parents feel overwhelmed by the task of parenthood. One man candidly said, "Before I got married I had three theories on raising children. Now I have three children and no theories!"

Quote Magazine published ten behaviors children ages 8 to 14 identified as qualities they wanted in parents. These young people, from 24 countries, agreed on ten traits they believed were important for all parents to possess.

Here they are:

- They want harmony. They do not want their parents to have unresolved and destructive conflict in front of them.
- They want love. They wish to be

- treated with the same affection as other children in the family.
- They want honesty. And to be told the truth.
- 4. They want acceptance. They desire mutual tolerance from both parents.
- They want their parents to like their friends. They want their friends to be welcomed in the home.
- They want closeness. They desire comradeship with their parents.
- 7. They want their parents to pay attention to them and answer their questions.
- They want consideration from their parents. They do not want to be embarrassed or punished in front of their friends.
- They want positive support. They wish for their parents to concentrate on their good points rather than their weaknesses.
- They want consistency. They desire parents to be constant in their affections and moods.

It appears that children want what all of us

want - respect, consideration and love. In fact, these work well with "children" of all ages! Raising a child has always been a monumental task, but it sure seems to get more complicated every year. Do you suppose that's because as we get older we forget what it is like to be thirteen?

Today it seems like the cultural distance between adults and young adolescents is especially large. Yet, we know that every young person still wants adult relationships built on respect, consideration and love. Each young person is confronting difficult issues and dealing with unanswered questions, conflicting priorities and growing expectations - just as we did. What we have in common is that the primary challenge of growing up remains the same as what we faced in our time: becoming the very best one can be. There's no doubt how valuable supportive adults can be in this endeavor. When you have your parent hat on, remember the ten behaviors children want in their parents.
